### 1 Learn to Skate -

- Tot 1, 2, 3, 4
  - Ages 4-5
  - No Experience
  - Helmets Required
  - Hockey Skates introduced at Tot 3
- Pre-Alpha
  - Ages 6 & Up
  - No Experience
  - Helmets Required
  - Hockey Skates introduced after 4th class if the skater is passing required elements
- Hockey Skating Skills
  - Age may vary
  - Helmets Required
    - Hockey Helmets preferred, but not required
  - Additional equipment preferred, but not required
  - Prerequisite Tot levels and/or Pre-Alpha based on age
    - Advanced skating skills from Alpha preferred, but not required

# Learn to Play / Little Penguins

(Prerequisite - 2 sessions of Learn to Skate for both programs)

- Learn to Play is Step 2 in becoming a hockey player
  - Focus: Individual Skating Skills
  - Introduction to Hockey Skills and Drills Registration is completed through S&T Bank Arena
  - Program is taught at S&T Bank Arena
  - Equipment is not provided and is required
- Little Penguins program parallels Learn to Play with similar introduction of skating skills and hockey skills
  - Registration is completed through the Penguins Organization
  - Equipment is provided in the registration fee
  - Program is taught at S&T Bank Arena

### (4) In-House / IYHA

• Combining skills and techniques that are taught within the In-House league while taking the initative to begin play in a travel league, like the IYHA, is Step 4 in becoming a hockey player

## BIYHA / Travel Leagues / In-House

- Step 5 in becoming a hockey player is continuing to develop skills through the In-House league that will provide an evident advantage while maintaining competitive play within a travel league association

#### B)In-House/ Intermediate

(Prerequisite - 2 sessions of Learn to Skate + Learn to Play)

- In-House Hockey and the Intermediate Skating Program together are Step 3 in becoming a hockey player
- In-House Hockey is divided into age groups
  - Team play is introduced
  - Fundamental skills are perfected
  - Situational Play is instilled
  - Practices occur on Tuesdays
  - Game simulations occur on Fridays
  - In-House participation is encouraged through high school
- Intermediate Skating focuses on advanced skating skills
  - Efficient crossover development
  - Polished turns and transitions
  - Established edge control
  - Dynamic stops and starts
  - Explosiveness

#### 6 Middle School / High School / In-House

- Maturing in age as well as skill requires a continuation of learning and adaptation to the game with the guidance of the In-House League, while expanding in-game knowledge on middle school or high school teams is Step 6 and 7 in becoming a hockey player
